Historical Context	<p>The Hall was purpose built for the Antigua Divisional Board as venue for its monthly meetings in 1886. Previously meetings had been held at the Yengarie school house. The name was later changed to Yengarie Hall. The last meeting of the Antigua Shire Council was held in the Hall on 2nd April, 1917. After being vacant for some time the Hall was used by local residents for social gatherings, church services and as a polling place. In the 1930s residents formed a committee to raise funds for urgent renovations through regular dances after which the Hall was again used for social activities like dances and functions. A major highlight was the reception following the opening of the Hasselbach Bridge over Graham's Creek on 18th October, 1969. Restoration by the Burrum Shire Council in 1975 was necessary after the Hall had fallen into disrepair again. Since that time the Hall was used for weekly meetings by a mother and child play group from the district. In preparation for the Hall's centenary celebrations a committee was formed in 1985. The local community of Yengarie supported by Woocoo Shire Council invested a lot of work and determination into transforming the Hall into a recreational facility that includes a barbecue area and tennis court (1988).</p>			
Physical Description	<p>Brick building, façade rendered, single entrance door with one window either side, single windows on side and rear walls, ornamental brickwork above window, windows protected by flat corrugated iron sheeting mounted on timber frame, concrete window sill, air vents above windows and near ground level, some efflorescence visible on exposed brickwork, concrete water tank on the back right hand side, undercover area on the front right and back left side, toilet block behind the building.</p>
